One of the rules of firearm safety is to know how your firearm operates. To do this, you need to know the intricacies of your firearm. It is true that you basically aim the firearm at your intended target, pull the trigger and Voila! You discharged your firearm. The more important question is "Did you hit your intended target or did you miss?" Even more important, "Did you fire your firearm when you pulled the trigger?"



There are some basics that everyone who handles a firearm needs to know. You start with reviewing the owners or users manual. I know that most people just want to assume they know everything but I'm sure you'll agree, we don't know it all. If we did, we wouldn't be where we are in life and we'd all be living our dreams. So if we humble ourselves to accept the fact that we don't know it all, then we and the people around us will be that much safer with and around firearms



New Firearms

New firearms typically come with manuals. You'll reinforce some information that you might already know about it and may discover other important information that you don't know about. Information such as:

- Does your firearm have a safety or not?
- Is your firearm single action, double action, or both?
- Does your firearm have a de-cocking mechanism or not?
- How do you clean and lubricate your firearm?
- Where is the magazine release?

- What type of guarantee does the firearm come with?
- Does the cylinder rotate clockwise or counter clockwise?
- How and where do you send it for repair?
- Are there types of ammunition I shouldn't use?

Pre-owned Firearms


If you buy a pre-owned firearm or inherit one and the firearm doesn't come with a manual, you can usually get one from the manufacturer. You can either call their customer service group or you can visit the manufacturer's web site. Manufacturers are more than willing to make this information available to you as a service rather than run a risk of having you or someone you know or care about being a statistic because you didn't know how to properly use their product.

The 2 Most Common Causes of Firearms Accidents are...
